We'd heard stories about the jungle that had made us cautious of our arrival. All we knew for sure was we were going to serve the long-term mission. We just didn't know what to expect.

So what do you do when you have no clue?

I realise this doesn't just happen in missions. No; this is life. We can't always know what will happen. It makes life a little risky and unknown. We had no idea what we were going to do, see, feel, or even where our final destination was. We didn't know what to do.

The good news is that "when you don't know what to do, you always know what to do - pray."

Yes, God is the same no matter where we are or what we feel. So amidst uncertainty, we prayed.

The mission has recently had about three months of things breaking down - the boat motor, the cars, the weed eaters, etc. We had gotten behind on the farm, which made me behind on children's ministry and getting to the schools to teach the Bible. I'm thankful for the team coming and helping us to catch up on things we were behind on. We got a shot in the arm to get going again.
