


"We've been together now over 50 years and have decided to get married and make commitments to serve the Lord for the rest of our life." This couple is in one of our house churches.

The communities here are hard. It is hard to see any progress or change toward Christian ethics and morals. We pass the bar on Sundays and see the biggest "congregation." I had been so discouraged because I was looking back over the years seeing few changes, and then comes forth an encouragement of commitment like this couple.

Soon afterward, the community gave us an abandoned school house to have services. I taught one Sunday at Ramon's church on how the modern church doesn't want to inconvenience ourselves in the Lord's work, and how we were sitting comfortable on a trail of sacrifice. I guess they agreed, because at 3 a.m. Ramon brought a boat full from his little church downriver to help!

I've had the privilege of teaching in several countries in a good number of churches on many subjects, but mostly on Christ's calling to complete commitment and to missions.

I administer the farm, write children's lessons, coordinate boats, gas and repairs, etc., and teach and preach in between. I write the Sunday school lessons which are passed from leader to leader. For each lesson I find illustrations, memory verses, an application and a craft. I also write the lessons for home Bible Studies since they must be appropriate for the reading level of those in this area.

Our annual Christmas Fiestas begin soon in the many villages where we hold Christmas services and pass out gifts to the children. We are also getting the physical plant ready for the next group of students for the January School of Missionary Training.
